God's Grace and Mercy

English	Greek (NT)	Hebrew (OT)	Meaning	Example
Grace / Favor	χάρις (<i>charis</i>)	חֵן (<i>hēn</i>)	Undeserved favor or kindness	Gen 6:8 – “Noah found favor”
Lovingkindness / Mercy	χάρις / ἔλεος (<i>charis / eleos</i>)	חֶסֶד (<i>hesed</i>)	Steadfast, covenantal love	Exod 34:6 – “abounding in <i>hesed</i> ”

Cyclical vs. Linear Views of History

View of History	Description	Examples
Cyclical	History repeats endlessly in recurring patterns (creation → destruction → creation again). No final goal: events recur like seasons or reincarnation cycles.	Hinduism (yugas, samsara), Buddhism (reincarnation), Stoicism (eternal recurrence), and some Greco-Roman cosmologies
Linear (Biblical)	History is a story with a beginning, a direction, a climax, and an ultimate destination. It is guided by God's will and moving toward His final purpose.	Biblical worldview (Creation → Fall → Redemption → Consummation)

God has revealed truth in all areas of Life.

- **Politics** (Daniel 2:21; Romans 13:1-4; Micha 6:8; Psalm 2:10-11).
- **Economics** (Deut 8:18; Proverb 11:1; 19:17; 2 Corinthians 9:6-8)
- **Education** (Proverbs 1:7; Deut 6:6-7; Colossians 2:3; 2 Timothy 3:16-17)
- **Religion** (Deut 6:4-5; John 4:23-24; Acts 17:24-25; James 1:27)
- **Social Issues** (Gen 1:27; Isaiah 1:17; Matthew 25:35-40; Galatians 3:28)

Christianity as a Worldview: What Is the Biblical Worldview?

— God’s creation, our fall, His redemption through Christ, and our restoration in Him.

1. The Biblical Worldview Begins with God

- The Bible starts with God — “*In the beginning, God...*” (Genesis 1:1).
- He is the Creator, Sustainer, and ultimate authority overall.
- Everything exists for His glory, not ours (Psalm 19:1; Colossians 1:16).
- The story of the Bible is not primarily about us finding God, but about **God revealing Himself to us**.

2. It Includes Us — Created in His Image

- Humanity was made “*in the image of God*” (Genesis 1:27), designed for a relationship with Him.
- This means our value, purpose, and identity come **from God**, not from society or self-definition.
- The fall (Genesis 3) broke this relationship — sin separated us from God and distorted how we see Him, ourselves, and the world.

3. The Central Focus is Jesus Christ

- The entire story of Scripture points to Jesus — the bridge between God and man (John 14:6; 1 Timothy 2:5).
- Through His life, death, and resurrection, God offers reconciliation and a restored relationship with Himself.
- Jesus reveals both who God truly is (“*He who has seen Me has seen the Father,*” John 14:9) and who we were created to be — living in obedience, love, and truth.

4. The Biblical Worldview Shapes How We See Everything

- It’s not just a “religious” view; it’s a **lens** through which we understand all of life — truth, morality, relationships, work, suffering, and hope.
- Because of Jesus, we see the world as it really is: fallen, yet redeemable; broken, yet being restored.
- This worldview moves us to live in fellowship with God and reflect His love and truth to others (2 Corinthians 5:18–20).

Conclusion: God → Us → Jesus → Reconciliation

- **God** — Creator and Sustainer → **Us** — Created in His image, fallen through sin → **Jesus** — The Mediator and Redeemer → **Reconciliation** — Restored relationship and eternal life.

The Biblical worldview is God-centered, Christ-revealed, and Spirit-empowered. It tells us who God is, who we are, what’s gone wrong, and how we’re made right again — **through Jesus Christ**.
